Resident Profile: Sandy Stein

We really appreciate everyone thinking of us and what everyone has been doing for us! Sandy was born in Salem, Oregon and grew up in Harlan, OR. "It was just a small area, with no stores or doctors. There was an elementary school which I attended. When it was time to go to high school, we were bussed 35 miles to Eddyville High, which is on highway 20 towards Newport."

"I thought growing up in that area was great. My brother Gene is 2 ½ years younger and we'd do the usual kids stuff, hiking around and swimming in Big Elk Creek. My dad was a logger and my mom was a school bus driver. She drove the first of three busses we had to take each day to get to Eddyville for school.

"I had a good time in high school. My parents took us to all the school events. My favorite subject was history, particularly ancient history, Romans and Greeks. I graduated in 1959 and I'm still in touch with some of the friends I had there.

"In 1960 I enrolled in Oregon State University in Corvallis. That was a big change for a small-town country girl. I met my husband Dave there in 1961, and we married in 1962. We had 2 girls, Sherry and Shelly. We moved around a lot: we lived in Salem for awhile, then moved to Nampa, Idaho, then to California, Alaska and back to California.

"Alaska was great, but I think California was my favorite. We lived about 35 miles south of Los Angeles. Dave and I eventually parted. I stayed in California until my girls both graduated from college, then I returned to Salem, where I was born. My mom lived nearby. I worked as an agent for a construction company. I retired in the early 70's."

Sandy has done quite a bit of volunteer work over the years. When she was in Alaska, she volunteered as a teacher's aide at her daughters' elementary school. In Oregon she volunteered as an office coordinator for Marion County. Back in California she joined a horse-riding group and taught kids about horses and how to ride.

Sandy loves horseback riding. "We did it a lot. My husband and I both had our own horses," she recalled. Sandy is also a big dog-lover. "I've always had dogs, from the time I was a kid. German Shepherds were my favorite. Some dogs I adopted from shelters. Now I have Sadie, a small dog I rescued from a shelter," she said.

Sandy has been living at Mesa Vista since May of last year. "It's just good," she said, "I've made friends here, and Shelly lives right nearby."




Labor Day is a national holiday in the US, taking place on the first Monday of September. Labor Day celebrates the contributions that workers and organized labor have made to the development of the country.


As the Industrial Revolution reached its peak in the late 19th century, many Americans worked 12 hours a day, 7 days a week, in physically demanding, low paying jobs. Children as young as 5 or 6 worked in factories and mines across the country, earning a fraction of what their adult counterparts were paid. People of all ages, often poor or recent immigrants, faced extremely unsafe working conditions, with insufficient access to fresh air or sanitary facilities.

As manufacturing and mining jobs increased in importance over farming, labor unions, which had first appeared in the late 1700's, grew and became more vocal. Unions began organizing strikes and rallies to protest poor conditions and compel employers to renegotiate hours and pay. Many of these events turned violent.

In 1882, thousands of workers in New York City took unpaid time off to hold the first Labor Day parade in the US. The idea of a special holiday recognizing workers spread to other major cities across the country, and some states passed laws recognizing one. Strikes and violence continued, but progress was being made. Finally, in June of 1894, President Grover Cleveland signed legislation making Labor Day a federal holiday.

Labor Day weekend has become a holiday symbolic of the end of summer in the US. Many schools commence their year right after Labor Day (although in this area most now start earlier). Picnics and backyard barbecues have become a popular tradition for many, with larger cities often hosting fireworks displays and concerts to celebrate the American worker.

History of the Grand Valley

BATTLEMENT MESA

In 1885. Dr. C. L. Hayward and his wife. Minnie, who was a sister of Ben and Nels Good, also came to the Mesa from Maine, and were cordially welcomed, not only by the people on Battlement Mesa but by the whole area, as now the community had a real doctor, whose services were sorely needed in this new land. Dr. Hayward was a nice, kind person as well as a good doctor; and his wife was an asset to him in many ways in his practice, especially in caring for new babies and the new mothers. The Haywards owned

and improved several different places on Battlement Mesa and Wallace Creek and it has often been said "You can always tell where Dr. Hayward has lived as there are

Mr. William Duplice, who was born and raised in Bangor, Maine. and had met and married a girl from Argyle, Wisconsin, decided to come west and in 1880 moved to New Castle, and eleven years later, 1891, came on down to Battlement Mesa where several other families from Maine had settled. The original name of the family was Duplisse but has always been spelled Duplice by the families here, except on the very early tombstones.

James Gardner, with his children Rollin 0., James, and Harry came from Missouri in 1892, going first to the Collbran area, then over to this valley where he located what is known as the Dr. Hayward place near Pete and Bill Gulch, later settling on Battlement Mesa. Mr. Gardner's wife had died and he later married a Doby girl. The Doby family, too, had come from the East. The mother and father died early, but two boys, Joe and Jake, lived on the home place on Battlement Mesa until their deaths not many years ago.

R.O. Gardner married Belle Evens, who had come with her family from McCook,

Nebraska in 1894. The railroad had come through here by 1894, but the Evans family came with a wagon train of folks who wanted to bring their livestock, trailing them through to Battlement Mesa. Along the way they met and joined another wagon train in which the Sig Cox family was traveling. The Cox family settled on Parachute Creek.
